ADDENDUM

The local law would enact two new articles of the City's Zoning Code: to provide a regulatory framework for consideration of solar energy projects. The law does not approve any specific projects or actions

The first part of the local law consists of the Solar Energy article. The law establishes three types of solar energy facilities:

- Tier 1 systems, which are roof-mounted or building-integrated systems that would be allowed in all zoning districts with a building permit required and a variety of design criteria that must be met.
- Tier 2 systems, which include ground-mounted systems. A maximum surface area for total panels is set in the draft at 4,000 square feet. As with Tier 1 facilities, a building permit would be required, with specified design criteria.
- Tier 3 systems, which include systems that do not fall under Tier 1 or Tier 2. Special use permit and site plan approval would be needed. The law would allow Tier 3 facilities only in Industrial, Light-Industrial and General Commercial zones.

The conditions for Tier 3 facilities also requires decommissioning of facilities no longer being used, as well as financial assurance to cover decommissioning costs. Also, provisions regarding expirations and extensions of approvals will be governed by the existing provisions of the Zoning Code's special use permit and site plan requirements.

The provisions of the Energy Storage Systems article are similar to the Solar Energy article: They establish two tiers of regulations, based on the total capacity of the batteries involved. As with the Solar article, the law would allow Tier 1 facilities in all zoning districts with a building permit required and would allow Tier 2 facilities only in the Industrial, Light-Industrial and General Commercial districts with special use permit and site plan approvals. The law would also impose decommissioning and financial assurance requirements similar to those for solar facilities.

The purpose of the law is to create standards for the installation and use of solar energy generating and storage systems to provide for the use of renewable, non-polluting energy resources. It is also intended to potentially decrease energy costs for residential and commercial properties. The law also establishes standards and requirements to minimize potential adverse visual and other impacts from such facilities.

LOCAL LAW NO. 9 OF THE YEAR 2020.

A Local Law of to Safety To Amend Title XI, Section 229, of the Charter the City of Rensselaer, New York, Relative the Constitution of the Board of Public

Be it enacted by the Common Council of the City of Rensselaer as follows:

ARTICLE I. INTENT

This Local Law shall be known as Local Law No. 9 of 2020, and shall amend Title XI, Section 229, of the Charter of the City of Rensselaer, New York, relating to the Constitution of the Board of Public Safety. This Local Law amends and supersedes all previously adopted Local Laws concerning such Constitution of the Board of Public Safety of the City of Rensselaer. The purpose of this Local Law is to update Section 229 of the City Charter to address those situations where there are either no or multiple members of minority parties on the City Common Council.

ARTICLE II. LEGISLATIVE ACTION

The Common Council of the City of Rensselaer, New York, hereby amends Article XI, Section 229, of the Code of the City of Rensselaer, New York, so as to read as follows:

§ 229. Constitution of Board.

The Mayor, the City Treasurer, the City Clerk, a Majority Member of the Common Council and a Minority Member of the Common Council, by virtue of their offices, while in office, shall be and are hereby constituted Commissioners and members of the Board of Public Safety. By duly adopted Resolution, the Common Council shall determine the Majority and Minority Members appointed to the Board of Public Safety. In the event that there are no Minority Party members serving on the Common Council, an "At Large" member shall be appointed to the Board of Public Safety in place of a Minority Member.

ARTICLE III. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Law shall take effect immediately upon its filing with the Office of the New York State Secretary of State.

Thank you for contacting Jefferson Solutions. As we discussed, I am providing you with a quote for a GASB 75 actuarial valuation.

We look forward to the opportunity to assisting you in developing a valuation under GASB 75. This letter outlines our understanding of the terms and objectives of our engagement.

We plan to start the engagements on or about October 1, 2020 and (unless unforeseeable problems are encountered) complete the engagement by December 31, 2020. We will analyze the underlying demographic data along with summary plan descriptions to determine your organizations liability under GASB 75. The purpose of our engagement is to calculate your City's full OPEB liability and determine the annual required contributions and annual accrued liability. Our combined report will include all information required for disclosure in the City's financial statements for the two years ending July 31, 2019 and July 31, 2020.

The following reflects the scope of services to be provided to the City. Jefferson Solutions will:

- e. Development of Total OPEB Liability. This section will show the development of the Total OPEB Liability which is to be accrued to date.
- f. Actuarial Experience. This section will illustrate the actuarial gains and losses that arise from experience different from that previously assumed, changes in actuarial assumptions and methods, and changes in program provisions.
- g. Development of Fiscal Year Expense. This section will illustrate the development of the expected OPEB expense under GASB No. 75 for fiscal year ending July 31, 2020 and actual OPEB expense for fiscal year ended July 31, 2019.
- h. Schedule of Deferred Outflows and Deferred Inflows of Resource as required for disclosure in the organizations footnotes.
- i. 10-Year Projection of Employer Benefit Payments (as applicable).

- k. Summary of Demographic Information showing relevant information about the population included in the valuation.
- A summary of Program Provisions illustrating the overall eligibility provisions for retiree health coverage, graduated eligibility provisions, the various plans offered by the organization, and Medicare integration methods by plan.
- m. Summary of actuarial methods and actuarial assumptions detailing the assumptions used to determine the organizations OPEB cost and obligation.
- n. Glossary of key terms used in the report.

In performing our engagement, we will be relying on the accuracy and reliability of information provided by the City. We will not audit, the information. The procedures we perform in our engagement will be heavily influenced by the representations that we receive from City personnel.

You agree to assume all management responsibilities for the actuarial services we provide; you will oversee the services by designating an individual, preferably from senior management, with suitable skill, knowledge, or experience; you will evaluate the adequacy and results of the services; and you will accept responsibility for them.

Jefferson Solutions shall retain all rights, title, and interest (including, without limitation, all copyrights, patents, service marks, trademarks, trade secret, and other intellectual property rights) in and to all technical or internal designs, methods, ideas, concepts, know-how, techniques, generic documents, and templates that have been previously developed by Jefferson Solutions or developed during the course of the provision of the Services, provided such generic documents or templates do not contain any Plan Sponsor Confidential Information or proprietary data. Rights and ownership by Jefferson Solutions of original technical designs, methods, ideas, concepts, know-how, and techniques shall not extend to or include all or any part of the Plan Sponsor's proprietary data or Plan Sponsor Confidential Information.

To the extent that Jefferson Solutions may include in the materials any pre-existing Jefferson Solutions proprietary' information or other protected Jefferson Solutions materials, Jefferson

Solutions agrees that Plan Sponsor shall be deemed to have a fully paid up license to make copies of the Jefferson Solutions-owned materials as part of this engagement for its internal business purposes and provided such materials cannot be modified or distributed outside the Plan Sponsor without the written permission of Jefferson Solutions. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, the parties acknowledge that the City of Rensselaer is a municipality in the State of New York and will comply with all Freedom of Information Laws and other laws requiring disclosure of public documents. Nothing in this contract shall be read to restrict the City's obligations concerning disclosure of public documents.

In the event of any dispute arising out of or relating to the engagement of Jefferson Solutions by Plan Sponsor, the parties agree first to try in good faith to settle the dispute voluntarily with the aid of an impartial mediator who will attempt to facilitate negotiations. A dispute will be submitted to mediation by written notice to the other party or parties. The mediator will be selected by agreement by the parties. If the parties cannot agree on a mediator, a mediator will be designated by the American Arbitration Association at the request of a party.

The mediation will be treated as a settlement discussion and therefore will be confidential. Any applicable statute of limitations will be tolled during the pendency of the mediation. Each party will bear its own costs in the mediation. The fees and expenses of the mediator will be shared equally by the parties.

If the dispute has not been resolved within 60 days after the written notice beginning the mediation process (or a longer period, if the parties agree to extend the mediation), the mediation will terminate, and the dispute will be resolved by final and binding arbitration under the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association. The arbitration will take place before a panel of three arbitrators. Within 30 days of the commencement of the arbitration, each part will designate in writing a single neutral and independent arbitrator. The two arbitrators designated by the parties will then select a third arbitrator. The arbitrators will have a sufficient background in employee benefits, actuarial science, or law. The arbitrators will have the authority to permit limited discovery, including depositions, prior to the arbitration hearing, and such discovery will be conducted consistent with the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. The arbitrators will have no power or authority to award punitive or exemplary damages. The arbitrators may, in their discretion, award the cost of the arbitration, including reasonable attorney fees, to the prevailing party. Any award made may be confirmed in any court having jurisdiction. Any arbitration shall be confidential, and except as required by law, neither party may disclose the content or results of any arbitration hereunder without the consent of the other party.

We estimate that our fees for these services will not exceed \$5,950¹ for the July 31, 2019 report. This report will satisfy the requirements of GASB 75 for a two year period. Our fee works out to approximately \$2,975 per fiscal year.

Our fee is inclusive of all travel and other out-of-pocket costs such as report production, word processing, postage, etc. The fee estimate is based on anticipated cooperation from your personnel and the assumption that the City will be able to provide us with all required data in an electronic format. Our invoices will be presented electronically at the conclusion of the engagement. We reserve the right to bill 50% of the fee upon delivery of the draft report and the balance when the final report is delivered. Payment is due within 30 days of the invoice submission.
